Anyway, I go over there having experience catching a bat before when I was a kid, and they were trying to kill it! I grabbed a pillowcase and carefully walked up to it once it landed and wrapped it up. Poor thing was shaking and squeaking. I wanted to investigate having a bat up close but I knew it was pretty scared. So we went outside and released it.

It went directly at my friend's head who wanted to kill it. Saving that bat distracted me enough from my psychosis I was able to ask for help. We saved each other that night.

A week later while sleeping my daughter was bit on her foot. The bat was still on the bed in the morning and my Dr told me to bring it in. Unfortunately it tested positive for rabies so my daughter went through all he shots she was 16.We teased her dates that she had all her shots

I try to educate people how beneficial bats are and I still just love them.

For B.C. Canada, my husband was cleaning up for our first date, his cat brought in an assumed dead bat. My husband loves bats, so he was upset that the cat caught one. He went to take it outside and it started flying around the dining room! He eventually got back outside still in good health!

I'm just glad he found us and not someone who is a afraid or even disgusted by bats. And I was thankful I knew about Bat World. I hope that little guy had a happy life

When I stopped to get my check, the lady who was processing it said she used to care for bats. WOW, I was shocked because it is not like you find a bat AND someone who knows how to care for them who is not associated with a rescue place, lol. Come to find out, the bat's wing was cut, she said it could have been done by a cat, which is correct, because there had been a stray sighted in the area, it allegedly killed some beach mice too, nature. After about a week, the bat got away from the lady, flew up into her barn and as far as I know, lived a happy little life.
